Civil Works Budget / Projects:

- \$114,506,000 for O&M for FY20
- \$10,086,856 in other Appropriations for FY20
- Anticipating FY19 Flood Supplemental money in excess of \$100M.
- Three Rivers project is being designed to preserve navigation access to the Mississippi River.
- Anticipate a significant customer funded hydropower recapitalization program into the foreseeable future.
- The White River Basin Study, conducted in conjunction with Arkansas State University, is being done to examine all uses of water in the basin and how well the system provides resources to meet those needs.
