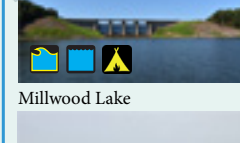
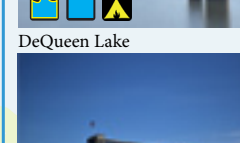
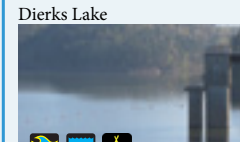
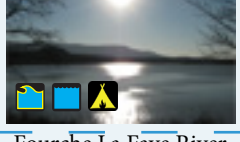
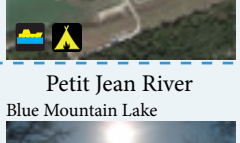
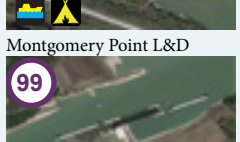
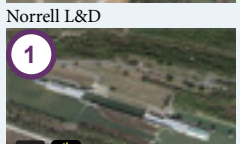
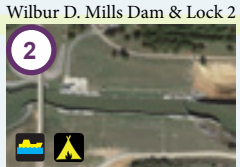
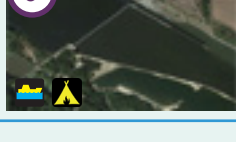
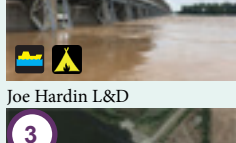
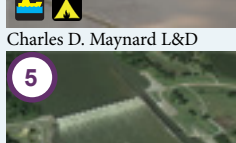
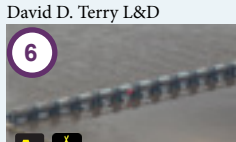
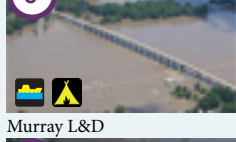
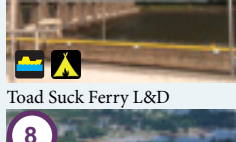
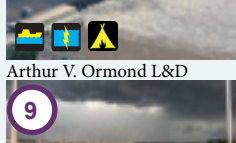
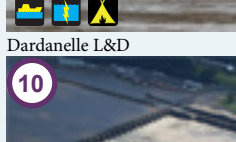
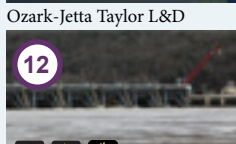


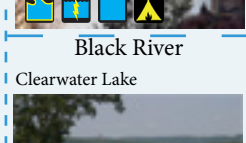
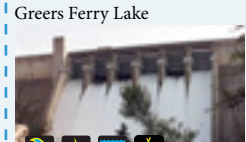
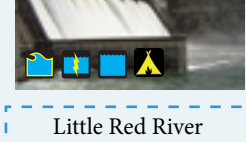
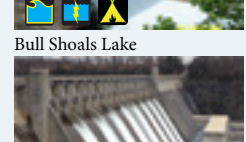
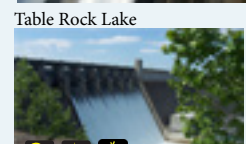
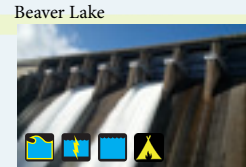


### Arkansas River Basin McClellan-Kerr Arkansas River Navigation System
