

Nationwide Permit Program Minimal Impact Riprap Bank Stabilization Requests

Minimal Requirements

Before USACE Regulatory can proceed with the evaluation of the Department of the Army permit application, for an efficient review process, we will require the following minimal information.

- a. A completely filled out and individualized (not copied) ENG Form 6082 with all blocks completed.
- b. A detailed narrative describing the project's purpose and need, all proposed activities, and the construction methods, materials, and equipment to be used.
- c. A set of maps (e.g., aerial, topographical, zoning) that clearly illustrate the project's location in relation to nearby water resources, roads, and landmarks. The project location must be clearly identified on these maps.
- d. Clear, to-scale drawings specific to this project, including both plan and cross-section views. These drawings must show existing and proposed conditions, the location of all structures, and details of the proposed erosion and sediment control measures.
- e. A detailed description of the project's impacts on Waters of the U.S. (WOTUS). This must include the area and volume (in cubic yards) of any fill or excavation and the total length of the bank that will be stabilized.
- f. A detailed description of how the project has been designed to first avoid, then minimize, and finally compensate for any unavoidable impacts to WOTUS.
- g. A detailed justification for a waiver to place more than one cubic yard of material per running foot below the Ordinary High Water Mark (OHWM) of the Aquatic Resource for this project.
- h. A list of any Federally listed endangered or threatened species or critical habitats in the project vicinity. You can obtain this using the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (USFWS) IPaC website: <https://ipac.ecosphere.fws.gov/>. Please include any prior coordination you have had with the USFWS.
- i. A statement confirming if any historic properties or cultural resources are located in the project vicinity. Please include any prior coordination you have had with the Arkansas State Historic Preservation.
